8.	<p>Tribal Treaty Rights and Cultural Value of Salmon (Information/Discussion) Hear a presentation on tribal treaty rights and the value and importance of salmon as a tribal cultural resource. This information is intended to deepen WRIA 8 partners' understanding of tribal treaty rights in salmon recovery and the importance of place and salmon to the tribes historically and today.</p> <p>Warren King George, Historian for the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe Preservation Department, collects and records oral history from tribal and community members and works with government agencies, museums, colleges, and private parties to ensure tribal treaty rights and tribal cultural resources are protected and preserved. He will share his perspective on protecting and integrating tribal cultural legacy, traditional knowledge, and cultural resources into actions to recover salmon populations and protect and restore salmon habitat.</p> <p>Joe Hovenkotter, Tribal Liaison for King County Department of Natural Resources and Parks, works to assure that the County honors tribal treaty rights when it implements projects and programs.
