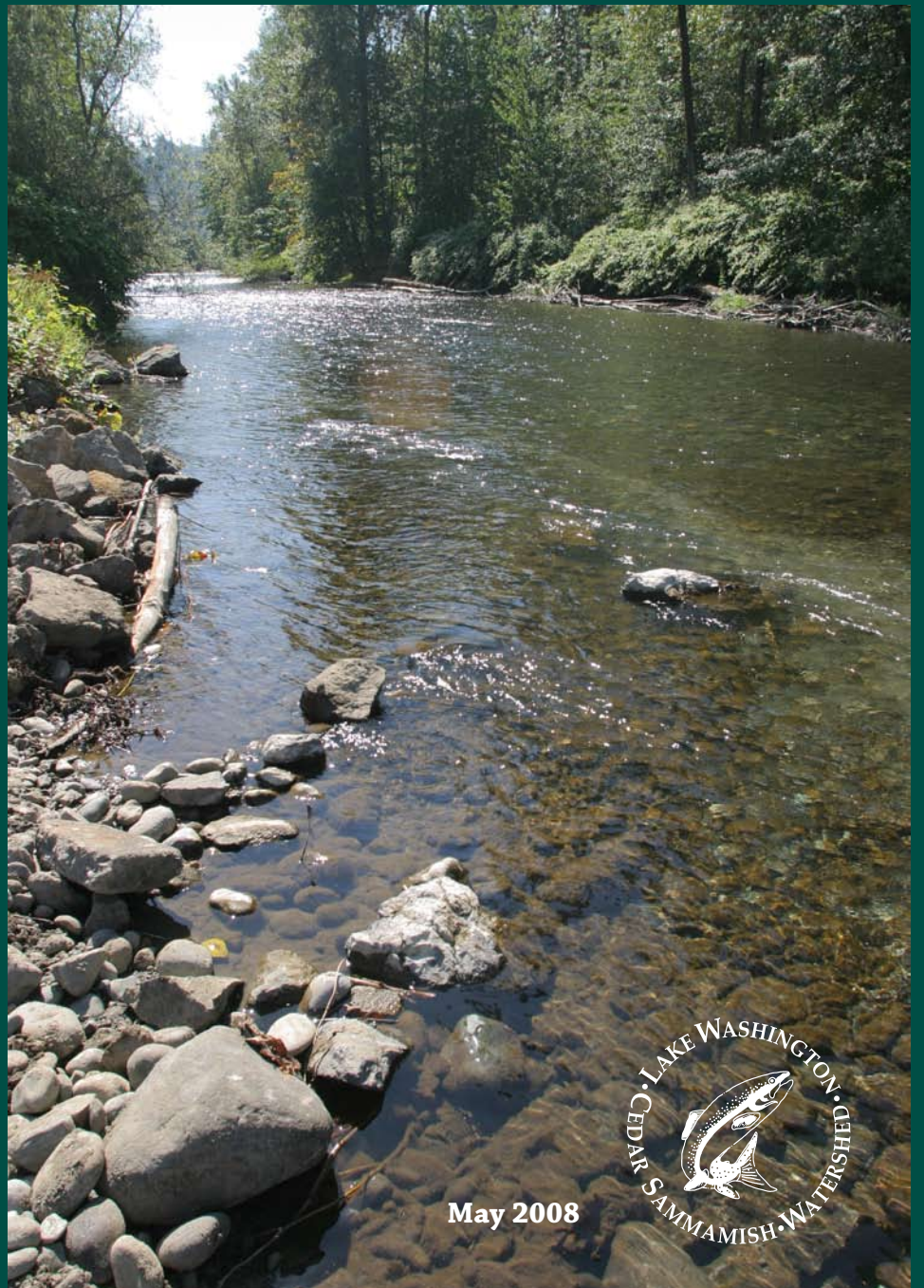

Some 40 years ago, before the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the Clean Water Act, or the Washington Department of Ecology ever existed, people in our watershed came together to clean up Lake Washington. Today it is our turn—all of us who live and work in the Lake Washington/Cedar/Sammamish Watershed—to decide whether we will change our habits and learn to coexist with Chinook salmon, or whether they will be lost forever.



The Lake Washington/Cedar/Sammamish Watershed Chinook Salmon Conservation Plan will guide our efforts as we create a future where people and salmon can live together. This report documents our progress in the first two years of implementing the plan.
